Feast to Famine



Another Feast of Tabernacles has come and gone. For eight days we rehearsed the Kingdom of God and looked ahead to a totally different world than the one we live in today. Yet here we are, still in this world, a world under the influences of the devil.

A famous song called "My Way," made popular by Frank Sinatra and written by Canadian songwriter Paul Anka, included the line, "And now the end is near." Is it? No one knows for certain, but it may be closer than we imagine. So are we better prepared for the battles we will face in this world after observing another Godordained festival?

How many nuggets of wisdom presented by each of the speakers can we reflect on to draw spiritual strength in the days and weeks ahead? Remember what Paul reminded us? "Put on all of God's armor so that you will be able to stand firm against all strategies and tricks of the Devil. For we are not fighting against people made

of flesh and blood, but against the evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world, against those mighty powers of darkness who rule this world, and against wicked spirits in the heavenly realms" (Ephesians 6:11-12, New Living Translation throughout this article).

There used to be a popular slogan in sports that could also be applied to society: "Its not whether you win or lose, it's how you play the game." The world we live in today has a distorted version: "Winning isn't everything, it's the only thing." The truth is, we live in a very competitive world. Life in this world can be a battle. But on the other hand, we can read Solomon's statement in Ecclesiastes that says, "I returned and saw under the sun that the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, nor bread to the wise, nor riches to men of understanding, nor favor to men of skill; but time and chance happen to them all. People can never predict when hard times might come. Like fish in a net or birds in a snare, people are often

caught by sudden tragedy" (Ecclesiastes 9:11-12). Life is very fragile. Not only are we sub-

jected to our own human nature—the pulls and desires of the flesh—but we are also subjected to the wiles of the devil. "Be careful! Watch out for attacks from the Devil, your great enemy. He prowls around like a roaring lion, looking for some victim to devour" (1 Peter 5:8).

It's easy to forget that the battle for our salvation is not with other people. We are in a battle with spiritual wickedness, the demonic angels of Satan—they are the adversaries. Just as Satan tempted Christ, his henchmen will tempt us. And so we are warned to be vigilant, to be prepared for whatever the devil can throw at us: "Use every piece of God's armor to resist the enemy in the time of evil, so that after the battle you will still be standing firm. Stand your ground, putting on the sturdy belt of truth and the body armor of God's righteousness. For shoes, put on the peace

Attendance around the globe at all United

The UYC in Zambia took place this year at a beautiful place called *Ciyanja-no*—meaning reunion—on the outskirts of Lusaka with 37 campers and 18 staff.

Most youths and staff arrived on Sunday and assembled in the hall for the official opening ceremony. Some were yet traveling from Nalubanda North, Kasumpa and Isoka. Present were the two ministers, Wilson Nkhoma and his wife, Dorothy; Major Talama and his wife, Felicia; and Deacon Jonathan Litaba from the Copper belt (Mufulira).

The youth officers of Zambia welcomed the campers and a special speech was given by Mukumbuta Talama. The emcee of the opening evening, Isaac Chipempele, called upon Mr. Talama, who welcomed the American guests and introduced senior pastor, Jim Tuck. Mr. Tuck said he and his wife, Joan, were thankful for the opportunity to help with camp. He mentioned that Jayson McDaniel would arrive soon from the U.S., and he declared camp officially opened.

Geared to learn, the campers came with a lot of excitement and first-timers could not wait for the fun, to begin. What started as a group of strangers a few hours earlier ended up as one group reciting verses and helping each other. They came from all over Zambia, but had a close bond from the first evening.

The campers woke up at 5:30 a.m. for a road run with sports master, Jonathan Litaba. After the morning exercise before breakfast, the campers were given duties, some were cleaning the hall, bathrooms, surroundings and, of course, their dorms.

Following breakfast campers had the daily morning compass check, and a memory verse for the day. The campers were asked why Christ came into the world, and many participated in giving answers of what they knew. Mr. Tuck challenged them to recite the verses given at the end of the day during the Christian living class.

The first activity of the day for the boys was speed-away, and they were so excited that they went to the sports field early to find out about this new game being introduced at camp. The girls had a class for arts and crafts with Joan Tuck. She taught the girls how to use a decoupage technique to make picture frames. They had a lot of fun. Later during the week, each camper was given a group photo of the campers and staff to put in their frames. The boys proved to be very adept at doing the craft project as well, and the girls showed themselves to be very adept at speed-away.

After lunch, the activities continued,



this time the girls had needlework with Felicia Talama, who taught them sewing and types of stitches they could use, later they made handkerchiefs. Everybody cooperated extremely well throughout the activities.

The rest of the events continued until after dinner when Mr. and Mrs. Tuck served the camp ice cream on behalf of donations of the San Francisco Bay Area churches of California. It was indeed exciting because everyone got a share.

On the Sabbath the attendance at the pavilion meeting hall increased to 85. Following services, we had the question-andanswer session, which ended in the evening. The session was exciting as campers asked a lot of questions, especially concerning dating and questions on the previous scriptures in their lessons. After dinner, campers were awarded certificates for their participation in the camp activities followed by ice cream and a dance in the evening.

The camp was incidentfree except for one boy who came with malaria from Mumbwa, but he was rushed to a nearby clinic

by Mr. Talama where the young man was treated. He recovered well and was seen playing speedaway with other campers.

The camp for this year was most





improved and exciting. It was a great success, a character building event for the young people of Zambia.

Remember the "Caregiver"

In the March-April issue of *United News*, Heather Disher wrote about a young man named "Sean" who was severely mentally handicapped, unable to care for himself, and born with some type of birth defect. In that article ("Birth Defects: No Justification for Abortion"), it appeared from the article that Sean was unaware of his situation, and that the caregivers just took care of him. God speed the day He will heal Sean and all others with infirmities!

The story inspired me to write on the subject of those born with birth defects. Unlike Sean, who is in an assisted living home with caregivers to help him, there

are many whose parents must take care of them through their adult life. The most devastating event that could happen to parents is having their child born with a major birth defect. Whether it's physical, mental or both, one cannot explain how difficult this is. It can mean a lifetime of doctors, surgeries, therapies, etc. The parents who are caregivers themselves can understand all these difficulties. Having children is a wonderful blessing, but when a child is born disabled or mentally impaired, it automatically changes the parents' lives and the entire family. Of course parents love their child no matter what, but now they must dedicate themselves to a different life—a life of continual medical necessities for their child on an ongoing basis.

My intent is not to only dwell on the outcome of birth defects but to broaden the understanding for those who do have healthy children. It is important to pray for disabled individuals, but we also must remember the parents and caregivers. These parents are caregivers dedicate their entire lives to caring for their offspring from childhood through adulthood, making many sacrifices along the way, and not truly experiencing a normal life as others do.

We all need encouragement in our lives

for many different reasons, but for those dealing with special needs, whether it's the disabled person or the parent/caregiver, faith and endurance must continually co-exist, which can only come from God through His strength and the prayers of family and friends.

So please remember the "caregiver" in addition to the challenged person in your prayers. They surely do need additional strength to be able to "walk the walk."

We certainly all look forward to God's Kingdom when everyone will be whole. God speed that day! UN

Another 10-hour drive to the center of the country found 110 more brethren from nine tribes who came to Meru, Kenya, from four countries. Located below the slopes of Mount Kenya, the cool and arid climate was appreciated by attendees from the congregations of Central and Eastern Kenya, Northern Tanzania, Rwanda and Burundi. Much appreciation was shown for those who recently donated to the initial phase of the site's construction, which included the land, toilets, washrooms and a temporary kitchen.

At each site, it was exciting to see members exuberantly bonding together in celebration of God's coming Kingdom on earth. A highlight was the sharing of our experiences and challenges that we all face back home in society. At each site brethren dined on local meats, fruits and



FORWARD! It's Not My Fault!

How often have we heard or even uttered those exact words when something goes wrong? It's often an initial reaction before we think of all the ramifications. We don't like to be wrong or liable and quickly grope for ways explain or justify failure or setback by placing blame on self last, if at

Christian conversion starts with admission of guilt, inadequacy and wrongdoing in thought and behavior. For a human that is courageous and bold.

When the apostle Peter preached on Pentecost after Christ ascended to heaven his words were indicting to the assembled crowd in Jerusalem. Many of these people no doubt were involved in the crowd tumult in Jerusalem at Christ's crucifixion. Notice what he said:

"Men of Israel, hear these words: Jesus of Nazareth, a Man attested by God to you by miracles, wonders, and signs which

God did through Him in your midst, as you yourselves also know—Him, being delivered by the determined purpose and foreknowledge of God, you have taken by lawless hands, have crucified, and put to death (Acts 2:22-23, emphasis added throughout). He then added in verse 36: "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ.

Those assembled hearing this sermon could have easily shifted blame on to the Jewish leaders who hated Christ, on to Herod who feared Christ, and on to the Roman government that actually executed Jesus. After all, they didn't actually run the spear into his side. But their reaction was not to shirk the indictment, but to take responsibility: "Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart, and said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, 'Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (verse 38).

This is the entry question for what it takes to be a Christian: "What shall we

Peter obliged by answering: "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

What he said was that one must change his ways, make a commitment through baptism and then receive God's Spirit.

The process is straightforward, but it starts with taking responsibility for your life. This should continue through your

Paul writes in Galatians 6:4-5: "Each person should judge his own actions and not compare himself with others. Then he can be proud for what he himself has done. Each person must be responsible for himself" (New Century Version).

Ask yourself: Am I taking responsibility for my life and what happens in it, or am I tempted to become a victim of what someone else has done?

In my role as president of the United Church of God I must continually ask this. If things don't always go the way I like them to, I need to find solutions and remedies. I must admit that we must do things better.

This position is the most constructive and garners support and respect.

Fixing blame continually on others is delusional and doesn't help. Christianity is a life of accountability and consequent blessing from God. Let's all view our lives in the light of this principle! UN

I cannot help but think of 2 Peter 2:5-9 where God condemns immorality, and particularly Sodom and Gomorrah. Peter talks of Lot being vexed daily by what was seeing and hearing around him.

On a trip during the Feast of Tabernacles, Portuguese senior pastor Jorge de Campos visited the site of the borehole (sponsored by LifeNets), which will provide clean water year-round for the entire village where Church brethren

On Oct. 14, Jorge de Campos and his wife Kathy visited Maloca de Moscou with David Hershberger from North Canton, Ohio, and Clyde Chinian from GeorgeTown, Guyana. They were accompanied by Benedito Gomes da Silva, dea-

con, and his wife Ana Helena, deaconess, from Maloca de Moscou.

They inspected the borehole dug by LifeNets. The Boa Vista-based drilling company Cataratas had drilled the borehole and installed the water pumping mechanism in the preceding weeks.

The first 56 feet (17 meters) of drilling were through dry sand. Below 56 feet depth they hit the water table, and the sand was now mixed with water. At about 70 feet (21 meters) depth, they hit rock. They continued digging through solid rock until 255 feet (78 meters) deep, where they found the first underwater vein of crystal clear water. They dug past two more veins and finally at 260 feet (80 meters), they hit a vein of water so strong that shot water up to about 70 feet (20 meters) high in the sky.

That's when they stopped digging and installed an electrical water pump at a depth of 100 feet (30m). The pump has a flow rate of 9,000 liters (2,378 gallons) per hour. The underwater table begins at 56 feet (17m) deep.

The brethren said that the water came from a rock, like the water Jesus Christ gave to the Israelites from a rock (Exodus 17:6).

Now we are proceeding ahead with the next phase of the agricultural project, which is to prepare the land for the Youth Corps agricultural project in December 2014, and to build a water storage tower. We have already given the men funds to plow, fertilize, and fence the land in preparation for the Youth Corps project.

The 12 Steps: A Spiritual Journey

The 12 steps have long been an important process in helping those who are recovering from an addiction. Its success lies in the fact that it involves spiritual principles for healing and recovery from the slavery of addiction. Ask anyone who has completed this process, and they will affirm the life-changing results. While there are many of these programs in communities around the world and these are all viable options for Christians today, the United Church of God wants to offer an online 12-step group to its members.

For a long time, members have felt ashamed, fearful of losing opportunities, positions or respect if they disclosed that they suffered from one of these addictions. The Church is changing its culture

in this respect, and as a body we are trying to be more helpful and not condemning if someone in the Church is suffering from some form of addiction. It should be everyone's responsibility to encourage, pray for and support those who need our help. Those who have hidden this issue in the dark need to come out and address it for their good, for the good of their families, and for the Body of Christ as a whole.

We are planning a pilot 12-step group that members can access online either by video or audio hook-up. We will be able to include up to 12 participants including facilitators. We need to know what the level of interest is and whether there are members out there who could be sponsors or accountability partners. We

would, as with all 12-step groups, strongly encourage anonymity among all participants.

The group would be for all forms of addictions including alcohol, drugs, shopping, gambling, sexual addictions (such as pornography), food addictions, and Internet addictions. People in the group would not need to disclose what form of addiction from which they are suffering.



The Seven Elements of the Zone

Structure

"Let all things be done decently and in order" (1 Corinthians 14:40).

nited Youth Camps are a constant beehive of activity. From the morning wake-up call until lights-out, the seven days at camp are scheduled and organized for the benefit of everyone. Even fellowship and relaxation time are built into a schedule that keeps everything

going smoothly. Beginning with the first person to arrive at camp until the last one leaves and the gate is shut, the biblical admonition to have all things done decently and in order is put into practice.

The Zone element of structure provides many important lessons and principles for the camp environment. The first and foremost is safety. While at camp, our UYC program is designed to help campers "challenge their limits" instead of "limiting their challenges."

Each camp provides a wide range of

challenging activities for the campers. Many of these activities, such as arts and crafts, volleyball, softball, or field games, are not inherently dangerous. What few injuries occur in those activities are often minor, perhaps mildly sprained ankles.

In other activities, such as rock climbing or any sport on or in the water, safety must be our primary concern. We make sure that each activity is fully staffed, plus

the staff coordinator is certified to teach the activity and pre-

pared for any safety concerns that might arise. As an illustration, at Northwest Camp we have activities at an ocean beach, two lakes, and a river. Our staff for 2014 included 11 certified lifeguards. The safety training and activity

organization are just two examples of the benefits of structure at UYC. Structure also prevents chaos or confu-

sion and provides the boundaries necessary for a successful summer camp. This is in keeping with 1 Corinthians 14:33: "For God is not the

author of confusion but of peace, as in all the churches of the saints."

Psalm 19 tells us that we can learn about God by observing the perfect motion of the earth, moon, and stars. It's easy to see that our Creator God is the author of perfect structure. At camp, operating according to standards everyone has agreed to provides a sense of security.

Some observers (such as this past year the director of summer camps for the United Methodist Churches of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho who visited and participated in our camp for two days) have noted that our camps run like a fine-tuned watch. Staff and campers know where they should be at each hour

of the day. The daily Christian living themes and memory verses provide a spiritual emphasis and framework for the day. The daily lessons are reinforced in the various activities, campfire stories, and discussions with dorm parents.

One of the many lessons that campers learn by attending a

that comes from the Good News, so that you will be fully prepared. In every battle you will need faith as your shield to stop the fiery arrows aimed at you by Satan. Put on salvation as your helmet, and take the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God" (Ephesians 6:13-17).

Trials and Sorrows

Along the way we may have some battle scars. Jesus warned that in this world things can get tough: "I have told you all this so that you may have peace in me. Here on earth you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because I have overcome the world" (John 6:33).

When we made a covenant with God at baptism, we entered the marathon of the Christian life. Notice how the apostle Paul put it: "Remember that in a race everyone runs, but only one person gets the prize. You also must run in such a way that you will win. All athletes practice strict self-control. They do it to win a prize that

will fade away, but we do it for an eternal prize" (1 Corinthians 9:24-25). As Paul said to Timothy, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished the race, and I have remained faithful. And now the prize awaits me—the crown of righteousness

some of those precious nuggets of wisdom from the many messages delivered over the eight days—messages that are like jewels in our crown of righteousness, the same crown the apostle Paul referred to in his letter to Timothy? Will we use those

that the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give me on that great day of his return. And the prize is not just for me but for all who eagerly look forward to his glorious return" (2 Timothy 4:7-8).

And so as another Feast of Tabernacles passes into history, a question we might ask ourselves is this: Did we take home

God-inspired messages as battle armor back in a world that is under the devil's control? "Therefore submit to God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" (James 4:7-8, New King James Version).

The apostle Paul also reminds us that as we reflect on the Feast and all those mes-

sages we heard, we need to consider that while we are still in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh: "For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty in God for pulling down strongholds, casting down arguments and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God, bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ" (2 Corinthians 10:4-5, NKJV).

And when the battle is over, when we have finally completed the marathon of life, when we have run the race, and conquered the devil's world, we will exchange our battle armor for a beautiful white robe. "Let us be glad and rejoice and give Him glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and His wife has made herself ready. And to her it was granted to be arrayed in fine linen, clean and bright, for the fine linen is the righteous acts of the saints" (Revelation 19:7-8, NKJV).

As the seasons change, we can look back on the Feast of Tabernacles 2014 with inspired memories and focus on the warmth of the coming renewal of God's symbolic plan of salvation as it begins again with the Passover. UN







■ Beyond Today to Change Time Slot on ION Television Network

Because of their expanding audience, the ION Television Network has made a business decision to place their own network programing to begin at 9 a.m. every day of the week. Up until now, their programing has been starting at 11 a.m. each day. This change to 9 a.m. start time becomes effective Jan. 1, 2015.

Therefore, Beyond Today is going to lose its Sunday



morning position on ION after Dec. 31. The good news is that ION has been growing in overall viewership. This shrinkage of available paid programing time reduces their inventory by 25 percent. So we needed to make a decision on how best to move forward—so as to not lose the good times that are yet available.

After much deliberation the United Church of God purchased Friday mornings at 8:30 a.m. We've negotiated this after several rounds of talks to be the same as our current pricing. A major benefit of this change is that we now have full network broadcasting with all 61 O&O (owned and operated) stations in all 210 U.S. markets. We'll be reaching all 116.4 million households in the U.S.—in other words all 315 million people in the U.S., according to current census data.

We did contact representatives of other networks to see what they could offer to make sure that continuing with ION in this manner was our best choice, and no other network was able to offer anything preferable to what we will have starting Jan. 1 on Friday mornings.
